3 Effects of the Mahele Review

TOPIC: Three Effects (Social, Political and Economic) that the Mahele had on the Hawaiian Community

★(Social Effect) Hawaiians stopped <u>sharing</u>

- After the Mahele, the Hawaiians didn't have <u>access</u> to other lands because people now owned land
- They could only use the <u>resources</u> that was on their land
- People like the <u>konohiki</u> stopped sharing with the maka'ainana
 - They didn't provide <u>firewood</u>, which made the children eat potatoes and <u>taro</u> raw
 - They also didn't provide <u>timber</u> for shelter

★ (Political Effect) <u>Laws</u> allowed people to own land

- Before the land wasn't owned by people, it was owned by the <u>gods</u>
- After the Mahele, working class people like the <u>maka'ainana</u> could own land
 - <u>The Kuleana Act of 1850</u> made it possible for them to own land but there were certain requirements
 - the requirement were <u>surveying</u> the land, <u>presenting the claim</u> with the Land Commission and file claim by <u>1854</u>
- Even the <u>foreigners</u> were able to own land because of the <u>Resident Alien</u> Act on July 10, 1850
 - By owning land, they could sell or pass the land to their <u>heirs</u>
- another law was adverse possession
 - people could claim someone land if they didn't live on it for <u>10 years</u>

★(Economic Effect) The Hawaiian subsistence economy vanished

- After the Mahele, Hawaiians felt hemmed in-between other property owners
- They couldn't go to the uplands or <u>kula</u> lands
 - Hawaiians needed kukui nuts, timber and lands to pasture animals which was needed for survival

Topic: Why the Mahele Occurred Review

*The Mahele occurred because foreigners wanted lands for businesses.

- They would be growing sugarcane
- They were worried that their investments would be taken away if they didn't own the land.
- They felt that people should have a rights to own land

*Another reason why the Mahele occurred was because foreigners pressured Kamehameha III

- The foreigners didn't want to lease the lands, but to own it.
- The king was forced to create the <u>Land Commission</u> which looked at foreign and Hawaiian land claims
